Investment Approach

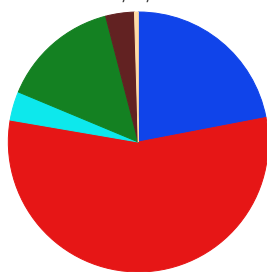

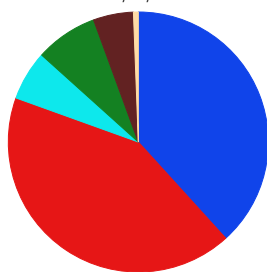

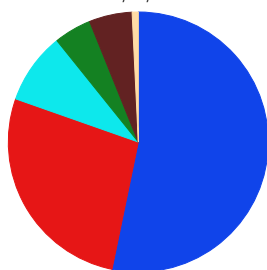
